

Clause 15 in Report No. 9 of Committee of the Whole was adopted, without amendment, by the Council of The Regional Municipality of York at its meeting held on May 21, 2015.

15 Community Investment Strategy 2014 Annual Activity Report

Committee of the Whole recommends adoption of the following recommendation contained in the report dated April 24, 2015 from the Commissioner of Community and Health Services:

1. Recommendation

It is recommended that Council receive this report for information.

2. Purpose

This report provides an update on the results of the \$6.1 million investment made in 2014 to 65 projects through the Community Investment Strategy.

3. Background

In 2014 the Community Investment Strategy continued to provide key services to low and moderate income York Region residents

Since 2003, York Region has provided funding to community agencies through a community investment strategy. Since then a wide range of services have helped stabilize the living situations of many residents.

Figure 1 shows the annual amounts allocated and the number of residents served.

The Strategy had a reduction in the number of residents served in 2014 due to two factors: annual service numbers may differ due to the types of projects funded, as some projects serve larger numbers including group sessions at school assemblies, while others serve small groups while maintaining a great impact; and, in response to the increasingly complex needs of residents some projects have changed the way in which services are provided. For example, some projects include individual case management over an extended period of time. These more intensive services address the root causes of an individual's issues and provide related supports. They are more costly and time consuming services and serve smaller numbers, but have longer term benefits.

In 2013, to enable the Region to invest more broadly in the community, and to more closely align these investments with Regional strategies, a new Community Investment Strategy was approved by Council.

The new Strategy introduced three funding streams:

 Community Based Services - invests in community-based programs and services that address service gaps and align with Regional community results. The result areas for the Strategy are:

- **Community Health**: Low and moderate income residents are healthy and able to make healthy choices.
- **Economic Independence**: Low and moderate income residents have and keep jobs that match their skills and have financial stability.
- **Housing Stability**: Low and moderate income residents can live in affordable, adequate and suitable housing.
- **Social Inclusion**: Low and moderate income residents are connected and able to engage in their communities.
- 2. Organizational Development invests in activities that strengthen an agency's ability to plan, develop and deliver programs and services that are needed in the community.
- 3. Innovation and Collaboration invests in initiatives that present multi-faceted solutions for working together and/or delivering social services.

A two-stage application process was introduced in the selection of 2014 projects for funding

Under the new Strategy one annual call for proposals is implemented each year. The call for proposals is a two-stage process. In the spring, eligible agencies are given the opportunity to submit Expressions of Interest (EOI) - Stage One. Agencies are required to demonstrate how their projects fit with one of the result areas of the Strategy. In September, successful EOIs that move to Stage Two submit full applications that include a detailed work plan and budget.

A Selection Committee comprised of York Region staff reviews proposals and recommends projects for funding. Representatives of external funders including the Ontario Trillium Foundation and the United Way of York Region are also consulted.

4. Analysis and Options

In 2014, sixty-five projects received \$6.1 million, helping 85,304 residents

There is always a large response to the call for proposals, and the total funding requested from the Region always exceeds available funding.

For 2014 funding, the application process for the Expression of Interest was released April 4, 2013 and closed May 5, 2013.

A communication plan using a variety of activities including an e-mail blast, the Region's web site, social media, and newspaper advertisements ensured a broad outreach to the community.

At closing, the Region received 113 Expression of Interests equating to \$12 million. Each Expression of Interest was assessed for fit with Regional funding priorities. Agencies with applications that were assessed to most closely match Regional priorities were moved to Stage Two of the process, where full project proposals are submitted. The second stage closed September 5, 2013, and 63 proposals were received totalling approximately \$5.7 million.

Table 1 shows the projects that received funding in 2014, the funding allocated, the number of projects funded in each stream and the residents served. A complete list of all projects that received funding in 2014 is included in Attachment 1 to this report.

Renewable Projects are projects approved for funding for up to three years. 2014 was the final year for funding these projects.

In 2014, approximately 4,400 individuals volunteered their time and expertise to assist in implementing Community Investment Strategy funded projects and contributed approximately 107,000 volunteer hours.

51 One-Year and Renewable projects were funded for communitybased services totalling approximately \$5.5 million

Projects funded through the community-based stream provided services that helped fill identified service gaps in the community. Many projects provided preventative supports that helped residents avoid the need for more costly interventions later on.

For example, the Enterprising Careers project implemented by the Women's Centre of York Region provided 69 women with the opportunity to develop life skills, participate in pre-employment workshops, and explore career options. In addition, the project coached clients who searched for employment and volunteer opportunities. The agency also developed partnerships with other community agencies and businesses. Clients who participated reported that they were more confident, more knowledgeable about second careers, had gained better networking skills, and had increased their ability to participate in further employment and training supports.

Three projects contributed to improving the health of residents

Supports helped residents who were challenged with tobacco addictions, seniors who were experiencing social isolation, and youth from economically challenged neighbourhoods who were able to receive nutritious meals and snacks.

More than 30,000 residents participated in these projects.

Thirteen projects provided supports to help residents move towards economic independence

Over 1,100 residents received employment supports that included psychovocational assessments and the development of career action plans, preemployment, life skills and employability training, computer training and upgrading, and job specific training. Through these projects many residents were placed on a path towards economic independence through becoming gainfully employed, being better positioned to compete in the job market or pursue educational opportunities.

Residents who were homeless or at risk of becoming homeless received supports designed to move them towards stable housing

Supports for the homeless and those at risk of homelessness included:

- Services through emergency winter shelters
- A mobile outreach service
- Housing support services that helped the homeless and those at risk of homelessness find affordable housing
- Assistance for seniors at risk of losing housing due to mental health and hoarding issues
- Character building and housing supports services for homeless and at risk youth

More than 20,000 residents accessed these and other related services.

Sixteen social inclusion projects gave residents opportunities to become more connected and engaged in their communities

Projects under the social inclusion community result provided services to more than 12,000 residents of all ages, such as:

- Children's after school and mentoring programs
- Leadership discovery for young teenage females
- Counselling and family strengthening
- Academic upgrading for parents and young mothers

 Services that helped youth with learning disabilities develop coping mechanisms and strategies to advocate for themselves

The Region's human service system was enhanced through initiatives in the Organizational Development funding stream

With increased demand for human services and more complex needs, it is important that agencies that provide these services enhance their capacity. In 2014, nine agencies were directly supported through projects that totalled over \$263,000. Strategic planning, the review and enhancement of service standards, developing more effective methods of communicating and reaching residents in need were among the capacity building initiatives funded.

For example, Family Services York Region developed a Centralized Intake Model that was more responsive, providing clinical assessments of clients at intake that allowed the agency to identify high needs clients. Clients were provided with referrals to alternative options while waiting for counselling. Over 95% of clients reported benefits from the new process, appreciated the improved responsiveness of the agency and the fact that they were connected to other resources. The agency also reported reduced client wait times.

In addition, the Region hosted three professional development workshops for board members and agency staff. Topics included: developing social media strategies, developing greater cultural competency, and self-care strategies for front-line staff.

The Strategy encouraged agencies to collaborate to find new ways of jointly delivering services

Approximately \$319,000 was invested in four partnership development projects that allowed agencies to provide better and more integrated community services. Projects included training in nutrition, promotion of healthy lifestyles, and better coordinated services for victims of domestic violence. Approximately 900 residents were served.

For example the Georgina Trades Training Inc. and the Georgina Community Food Pantry worked in partnership to offer a variety of programs to 118 low and moderate income residents in Georgina. The community garden produced over 1,500 pounds of produce, shared amongst the participants and donated to the food pantry.

Value for money and the accountability of agencies is monitored in several ways

Regional staff monitored the performance of funded projects by:

- Reviewing regular agency service and financial reports
- Project site visits and on site discussions with agency staff
- Review visits to selected agencies to explore in detail both the performance and financial management of projects

Many agencies are improving service planning using client feedback; census and other community data; and information shared through community networks to assess community trends and anticipate future demands.

Link to key Council-approved plans

The Community Investment Strategy was updated to more directly align with key York Region strategies and initiatives. It contributes to the Region's *Vision 2051*, the *Corporate Strategic Plan* and the various Community and Health Services plans and strategies. This is achieved through expanding investments in programs that will increase services in the community, strengthen the capacity of the human services system in York Region, and promote the development of new service delivery models that meet the needs of a population that is increasing in both size and diversity.

5. Financial Implications

Funding for the Community Investment Strategy is managed within the Region's approved budget. In 2014, agencies received a total allocation of \$6,154,308, and served over 85,000 residents at a per capita cost of \$72.15.

6. Local Municipal Impact

In 2014, residents of all nine local municipalities benefitted from services provided by the projects funded through the Community Investment Strategy. The connections and partnerships in the community established by funded agencies ensure that residents across the Region can access much needed services.

7. Conclusion

Through the Community investment Strategy, low and moderate income residents have access to proactive, preventative and responsive human services supports delivered by community agencies. Over 85,000 residents received supports that helped them:

- move towards economic independence
- increase their chance of housing stability
- become more integrated in the community
- adopt more healthy lifestyles

Also, the organizational and service delivery capabilities of community agencies were enhanced, innovative projects and collaborations were encouraged, and many community members were given the opportunity to volunteer their time and service to the community.
